

The recipient may be a graduating high school senior accepted to a college program, a 2- or 4-year college student, or a graduate student:

- They shall be majoring in one of the earth sciences or a field directly relevant to the mission of VGMS (e.g. science education, gemology and lapidary arts, etc.).
- They shall have maintained a grade point average of 3.0 or better during high school or undergraduate work.

- They shall submit a 250-word essay describing his/her educational goals:
- They shall have two separate letter-ofrecommendation from instructors in the earth science fields, science teachers, counselors, and/or community leaders.

# An All-Hands-on-Deck Issue: Seeking Everyone's Help Finding a New Home Base

As you may or may not know, we are under some serious pressure to find a new home base for our society. Our current digs for our workshop studio, museum, library, and storage space are on property of the Ventura County Parks Department. That department has plans to demolish the buildings there and perhaps even sell off the property or use it for expanded parking for Camp Comfort. They've been very gracious with the terms of our lease these past 17 years and in providing some breathing room for us to search for a new home base, but that breathing room is quickly expiring. We have about a year and a half before we'll likely need to vacate and make a move.

But a move to where? Diane Cook has spent a lot of time exploring different avenues, and we now have an ad-hoc committee consisting of Diane, David Springer, Art Lopez, and me to systematically explore avenues, agencies, and possibilities. If you would like to join this committee, we welcome your help. Even if not interested in being on the committee itself, if you have ideas, connections, or knowledge of possible target locations, we'd love to hear from you. This is truly an all-hands-on-deck issue, and the clock is ticking. We occupied a different location from the 1980s until the early 2000s, and it took a good long time to find our current home. In the meantime, we were without a workshop or museum and bled a good deal of money into two storage units for all our club resources. We definitely want to avoid replaying that tape!

On October 7, David, Art, and I attended a Ventura Unified School District (VUSD) Town Hall meeting that was seeking public commentary on what to do with several "surplus" properties that VUSD no longer uses.



Not too long from now, we'll need to bid a fond farewell to this facility. Can you help us find a new home base?

These include the former Washington School (96 MacMillan Ave.) and Avenue School (2647 N. Ventura Ave.). A long line of individuals stepped up for two minutes each to offer their thoughts or to make pitches for their particular organization or idea. I made a pitch for one of those school properties to be devoted to nonprofit community service organizations after sketching the varied community services and educational outreach activities VGMS offers. However, Art, David, and I agree this particular opportunity looks like a long shot. (With declining enrollments, VUSD needs money, and selling to real estate developers is where that's at.)

We'll have a clearer idea as to VUSD's plans for these vacant properties with the beginning of the New Year, but for now, we need to continue digging for new leads and making contacts within the community. Can you help? If so, contact David right away. Together, we will make this happen!

It's always fun to travel to another show sponsored by our affiliated clubs to view their displays and shop among dealers we don't always see at our show. It's even more fun to participate!

Nancy and I loaded Tornjak into the car along with materials for two display cases and hit the road for Monterey on September 19. The Carmel Valley Gem & Mineral Society was the first rock club we ever joined way back in the last century in 1991. We've remained members even after moving the Ventura in 1998, and we've attended every single show for the past 34 years. This year, I installed my "Fossil Lore & Legend" exhibit and Nancy installed her carved bears, and we spent most of the weekend helping with their silent auction, where we made all of our purchases. I think this is the very first show where we didn't buy a single thing from a dealer. I guess the garage is full. What can you give a collector who's already collected everything? In addition, we stayed in town on Sunday night, so we were also able to help with dismantling display cases and general tear-down duties.

multiple displays, so there wasn't as much member participation as one would hope. For instance, about half of those exhibits were entered by just a half dozen individuals. Here's hoping more members will get inspired by this year's displays and install their own in 2026. As I've always said, you don't need a huge collection to display; even three large pieces, nicely arranged with nice panel labels, make for a fine display.

If you've never been, I encourage you to check it out next year. You'll enjoy an escape from So-Cal heat with great Central Coast marine weather featuring thick morning fog that enhanced our early morning walks on Asilomar Beach. Are you a nature lover? The sea lions are out in abundance on the Monterey peninsula at this time of year, along with seals and sea otters. Inland, you'll need to drive slowly to swerve around the many deer. And if you're a dog owner, great news! Dogs are allowed at the show (and at many of the local hotels). We had just one problem: for the last three years, I've been looking forward to spending Monday winding our way home down the Coast Highway to snap up serpentine for our show's teacher station (and hopefully a jade pebble or two) at Jade Cove and Willow Creek, but stretches of the highway remain closed due to rock slides. # No Dinosaurs in Hawaii?? Erin Valenzuela

The Hawaiian Islands were formed by volcanoes after the dinosaur extinction, so they're too young—and the wrong rock type—to contain dinosaur fossils. However, I did manage to find some dinosaurs in Hawaii! The Bishop Museum in Honolulu happened to have an *Expedition Dinosaur* exhibit while we were there. I realized upon arrival that I had seen part of this exhibit before last September at the Discovery Cube Los Angeles. Later, I learned that the *Expedition Dinosaur* exhibits are mobile/traveling displays produced by Stage 9 Exhibits.



The Bishop Museum is gorgeous- Hawaiian history, science and culture.

The Bishop Museum featured Expedition Dinosaur: Into the Deep—so now I'm only missing Rise of the Mammals, and I'm on the hunt! The first section focused on the Jurassic Period, with animatronic T. rex, Stegosaurus, Dakotaraptors, and more. There were plenty of fun, interactive activities for kids. Into the Deep explored the underwater world of ancient marine reptiles, spotlighting plesiosaurs, ichthyosaurs, Spinosaurus, Liopleurodon, and Archelon (the world's largest turtle). We explored the ancient seas through displays and a cool video experience, discovering marine reptile ecosystems and diets, and learning where and how the fossils were found—and how all of it contributes to our understanding of Cretaceous marine life.

My other dinosaur sighting was at Kualoa Ranch. This 4,000-acre working cattle ranch on Oahu's North Shore also supports agriculture and aquaculture, with a shop and restaurant on-site. It's an amazing place to visit, but my main reason for going was to see its famous filming locations. I can guarantee you've seen a movie or TV show filmed at Kualoa Ranch—Lost, Jumanji, King Kong, Pearl Harbor, Magnum P.I. (both versions), and 50 First Dates, to name a few. My personal favorites, though, are the original Jurassic Park and the first two Jurassic World movies.

We took the "Jurassic Adventure Tour," which was full of sets and props from the films. One highlight was the spot where Dr. Grant, Lex, and Tim see the "gal—uh, galli—uh, Gallimimus!" dinosaurs fleeing from the *T. rex*. We saw bunkers, vehicles, fake trees, dinosaurs, and rocks, plus the fish ponds used for the mosasaur show scenes (later enhanced with CGI seats and cheering fans). Another standout location was the "Indominus rex" Compound from the first *Jurassic World—*I stood exactly where Claire watched the rex and saw the claw marks on the wall.





# Helping Out within our Broader Community: The Three Amigos Ride Again!

On September 16, John Cook and I once again saddled up the horses and hit the dusty trail north to Bakersfield to serve as judges for gems, minerals, fossils and lapidary arts at the Kern County Fair. Arriving at the fairgrounds, we corralled our horses with Wes Lingerfelt's of the Orcutt Mineral Society to round out The Three Amigos. Clipboards and scoresheets in hand, black sombreros flopping in the Central Valley breeze, and pencils drawn, for the next several hours we went case-by-case taking shots at all manner of rocky displays. Fortunately for The Amigos, the Kern County Fair only has case displays to judge (no individual items, as at the Ventura County Fair), so judging proceeds fairly quickly.

We've judged here many years now and saw the fair take a real hit from the pandemic. Prior to COVID, we would have 40 to 45 displays to judge. That number dwindled to 21 in 2021, then crept up to 27 in 2022 only to go back down to 21 in 2023. While low in quantity, high in quality. But the past two years the number has bounced back up, with 37 display cases last year and 35 this year. Folks offered beautiful self-collected rocks and minerals and well-crafted jewelry nicely arranged. It was especially cool seeing local material, like fossils from Shark Tooth Hill, a range of petrified wood and palm from the ancient Kern River channel, and other Kern County bounty.

Gems & Minerals is a division in most California county fairs. Next year, in addition to checking out our own Ventura County Fair, consider visiting the many others across the state to see what neighboring like-minded souls are up to. It may inspire ideas for a display of your own!



# National Fossil Day 2025 Erin Valenzuela

National Fossil Day, an annual tradition since 2010, celebrates paleontology, its education, and the importance of preserving fossils for future generations. The Wednesday of the second full week of October—which is Earth Science Week—is designated as National Fossil Day. Every year, a national park is chosen to showcase its fossil record, and that year's poster/logo is dedicated to that park. The John Day Fossil Beds Monument in southern Oregon is this year's national park spotlight. The monument was established on October 8, 1975—happy 50th anniversary! The monument covers 14,000 acres with plenty of plant and mammal fossils from about 44 –7 million years ago.

The area featured in the poster represents the Oligocene Epoch and is the Turtle Cove horizon of the John Day Formation rock layer. Ash flow and claystones have helped preserve the fossils in the ancient Pacific Northwest forests, which were unique and unusual for the area. The Oligocene Epoch spans 34 to 23 million years ago—a time when the tropical, wet climates of North America changed to the drier, cooler grassland habitats.

The John Day Fossil Beds contain some of America's last primate fossils—a small lemur-like mammal called *Ekgmowechashala*, which means "little cat man" in the Sioux language. The poster shows him on a hackberry tree, which was native to his time. The grasshopper is significant because the first fossilized grasshopper egg clutch was found at the John Day Fossil Beds. Other early mammals like horses, rhinos, dogs, and cats are also featured on the poster.



I find it humorous that the historical fur trapper and trader John Day never made it to the area that bears his name. The nearby river was first named after him, and the monument was later named for the river. Thomas Condon, a minister and amateur geologist, was the first to discover the importance of the fossil beds after he was shown fossils by cavalry soldiers. He was later honored by having the visitor center named after him.

I usually recommend visiting a national park on National Fossil Day; unfortunately, because of the government shutdown, services are limited or closed at national parks, monuments, etc. So this year, celebrate at a museum, attend a fossil event, listen to a fossil podcast, or just enjoy some fossils from your own collection!
